Westclyst Primary IS a CVCC Feeder School

The CEO of Cornerstone Academy Trust has today written to parents at Westclyst Primary School as follows: “there has been some parental concern that Westclyst Primary School was not listed as a feeder school for Clyst Vale Community College on Devon County Council’s school information database. Devon County Council has confirmed that Westclyst Primary School is indeed a feeder school of Clyst Vale Community College and has corrected the error in its school information database.”

Polite Parental Parking at Pick-Up Please

Clyst Vale was designed for 300 students, half of whom walked or cycled, at a time when there was much less car ownership. Therefore with 960+, with perhaps 85% requiring transport, it’s not easy to park at the peak time of 3.20. That said, there have been a few instances where staff and parents have been blocked in, parked so that other vehicles can’t pass (which risks gridlock when the buses pull out), have driven dangerously especially by the Sports Hall, as well as some instances of frayed tempers. Please be considerate. Please do not use the staff car park unless your child has accessibility difficulties – at 3.20 there are a lot of students walking across it, and it needs to be safe. Not always the case for families with other children to collect from elsewhere, but a simple solution is to delay the pick-up time by 15-20 minutes or more; there is a homework club four nights of the week.....

Next Thursday: DLD

On Thursday we are holding a Deep Learning Day. This is a day in which the normal timetable is suspended, and year groups work in more depth (hence the name) on a specific topic or theme. There are three DLDs across the year, and they provide a variety of activities and allow the development of skills which are not always helped by the one-hour lesson structure. So, there is commonly an emphasis on groupwork, teamwork skills, design and presentation. Topics and themes vary between years, of course, and DLDs are used to provide a focused delivery on PSHE topics in Years 10 and 11.

Next Friday: Non-Uniform Day

Roughly five times per school year we hold a non-uniform day, 50p minimum donation, monies collected in morning registration. The money raised always goes to charity, at least partly because there is an educational dimension to this, including our RRS ethos of being aware of human rights issues and natural disasters around the world. Next week’s proceeds will go to UNICEF.

In the last year or two non-uniform days have become a bit contentious because some of the clothing has been too scruffy, scruffy chic, or, frankly, not the sort of stuff one would wear to work or school. This is hard to explain when teenage logic is “non-uniform means I can wear what I like”. It’s a school day; the closest adult equivalent is a work day. There are many days on which people can in theory “wear what they want” but don’t: weddings, funerals, sports fixtures, Buckingham Palace tea parties, grandparents’ 70th birthday party. There was also a lot of nonsense about ripped jeans and crop tops being discouraged as they were distracting to the boys: the reason these are discouraged is because they are not appropriate for a work/school day. In fact, some discreetly ripped jeans are fine: it’s the ones with floor tile-sized bits of cloth dangling we don’t like. Anyway, thank you for your support in helping us negotiate through this trickiness: I strongly recommend dressing your children for comfort rather than speed.

“Autumn Safety”

I’m not sure if Devon & Cornwall Police are still running their “Autumn Safety” campaign of many years’ standing, but it’s a good one which we have been happy to support. In a conker-shell, the nights draw in, there’s half-term, Halloween and fireworks, and sometimes young people get over excited, take part in risky behaviours and also engage in anti-social behaviours in their communities. So the Autumn Safety campaign was about encouraging schools and youth organisations to reinforce good and safe behaviours, and encourage parents to know where, what and with whom their children are doing. There was a particular emphasis on looking after the elderly and vulnerable in our communities.

Late News: Teachers’ Pay Award

The School Teachers’ Pay Review Body (STRB) has issued their report today. It’s much as has been reported on the media for some while: most teachers have been awarded a 5% rise, with younger teachers on what’s called the main pay scale doing a bit better. There will be two main issues arising from this report: at present, hardly any school – including us – has budgeted for 5%; we budgeted for 3%, and the difference is not funded by central government. This won’t have much effect this year, but if it remains unfunded schools – including us – will be forced to cut back for 2023-4. The second issue is whether the teachers’ unions will be happy with this award; my hunch is that the answer will be no, and that there will soon be indicative ballots on whether to take action up to and including strike action. I try hard to avoid politics, but I think it’s safe for me to say that our children deserve adequately resourced schools whoever’s in power.

Sorry to end on a worrying note. At least it’s the weekend.

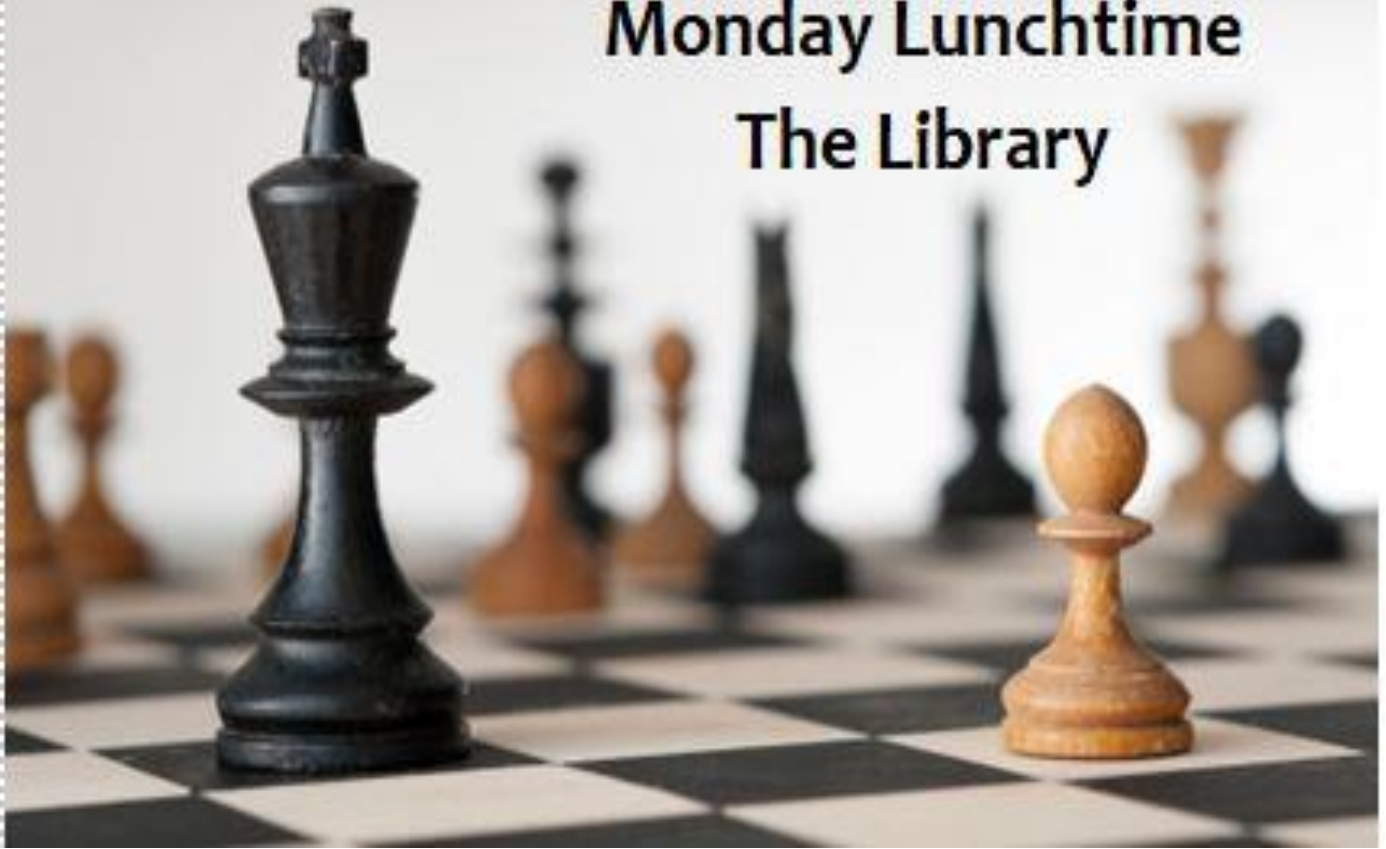

Torquay Boys Grammar vs Clystvale

On a calm and pleasant evening Clystvale set off down to Torquay to play the 2nd round of the national cup. Rumours of Torquay winning a recent cup put them odds on favourites to qualify.

This did not dampen the spirits of Clystvale with their confidence high after the 15-3 drilling of South Dartmoor in the previous round.



Clystvale lined up in their familiar formation of 3-5-2. Lewis in goal, a back three of

Olly, Rhys, Riley. 5 in midfield with **Lucas and Ethan** on the wings, **Harry and Charlie** in defensive midfield and **Max** in CAM. The pace of **Jack and Charlie** led the attack. Bringing along a strengthened squad of 5 subs including **Josh, Daniil, Harry, Fin and Nick**. **Daniil** making his debut for Clystvale after his transfer from the well known Ukrainian squad Dynamo Kiev.

Clystvale started quickly with constant pressure and possession, pinning the opposition in their own half. A good spell of passing and movement led to the opening goal. **Ethan** on the wing jinxed passed two players before sliding a through ball into the path of the pacey **Jack Bauer** who calmly placed the ball into the bottom corner to make it 0-1 Clystvale.

Clystvale still applying the pressure but with Torquay playing 3 up front it did often leave the back three man for man. A long ball over the top led to the first corner of the game to Torquay. A whipped corner went straight through the packed box and the Torquay centre back crept around the back post to nod home for 1-1.

Clystvale continued to dominate and press Torquay with chances and opportunities being created by both teams. Daniil came on for Riley and put on a dominating display and Nick swapping with Lucas on the wing. 1-1 Half time.

The game felt like a cup final with the intense atmosphere, but this again lifted Clystvale and they rose to the occasion. Attendance, Absence and Requests for Absence

Please let the College know of any absence on the first day it occurs.

If the absence continues beyond the first day, please contact the College on each subsequent day of absence, too. To comply with safeguarding obligations, we cannot simply assume a student's sickness absence is ongoing; we need to be certain that the reason for absence is due to continuing illness.

If you do not notify the College, then we will make contact with you to identify the reason for absence. This is important as it helps to reduce unauthorised absences and truancy.

Please note, the College may ask you to provide medical proof if a student is absent from College due to illness.

Medical Appointments

We encourage students to maximise their levels of attendance; research indicates a direct link between attendance and examination performance. The timing of many medical appointments means that often students can attend school first, and return afterwards. By doing so, students minimise missed learning whilst keeping their attendance levels as high as possible. Therefore, we ask that parents/carers send their child into school for morning registration, even when a medical appointment takes place in the middle of the morning. Similarly, appointments scheduled for the afternoon should, where possible, be arranged after Period 4 - during lunchtime. Students are encouraged to return to school after a lunchtime appointment, if they can.

COLLEGE DRESS

Clyst Vale aims to maintain a simple pattern of College dress to promote a clear sense of identity and enable students to come sensibly dressed, at reasonable cost, for a range of learning activities. If a student is improperly dressed, correct uniform will be provided for that day or the student may be sent home to change his/her clothing, at the discretion of the Principal. **If parents are in any doubt about the suitability of an item of uniform they should check with the College before buying it.**

Uniform for all students in Years 7 to 11

- White collared shirt
- School colour tie
- Clyst Vale V-neck jumper with College logo.
- Boys trousers - Banner Slimbridge (Black)/Banner Falmouth (Black).
- Girls trousers - Trutex GTN (2 pocket black)/David Luke DL965 black).
- Skirts - Blue Tartan and knee length
- Trutex Senior stitched down/Taylor Tartan (blue) skirt and may be worn no more than 2" above the knee. Knee length black tailored shorts may be worn.
- Black sturdy shoes or **all black** trainers.
- White socks or black tights with skirts.
- Clyst Vale reversible jacket or other outdoor coat.

- Eyebrow jewellery, facial, tongue, nose and lip studs are not permitted.
- Leather jackets, all denim garments and all hoodies are not permitted.
- Hats should not be worn indoors.
- Outer coats should be predominantly plain in colour and without large logos.
- A plain white t-shirt or vest may be worn under the shirt.
- On health and safety grounds, shoes should be appropriate for a work place. Flipflops, open toes, Uggs, Dr Martens (or equivalent) are not permitted.
- Jewellery may be worn, providing it is not excessive or potentially hazardous. However, it is a legal requirement that all jewellery must be removed before undertaking sporting activities. It is the responsibility of the wearer to do this.

The Principal, in consultation with the Governors of the College, will decide on the suitability of the appearance of a student attending the College - extreme hair styles, of either cut or colour, are not permitted.
